Every week we have competitions between the boys and the girls. These are supposed to be fun for the kids, and they assist with behavior control.

The first week that I led the services, the boys were losing so badly that they stopped participating. As you can imagine, it is very discouraging when you're

on stage and you can see that the boys are not having as much fun as usual.

After the service I was very discouraged. However, my wonderful friends were very supportive and encouraging. They helped me come up with creative solutions to improve the next service. Praise God! He has provided an amazing support system for me here!

The next week we implemented the changes and things went much better. I'm glad we're not expected to do everything perfectly the first time! We just need to take the opportunity to learn when things don't go well or when we make mistakes. I pray that I will always be willing to learn when faced with challenges or when my mistakes are pointed out to me.



Also, in January, we hired a part time employee. Ileana O'Neill is a young Nicaraguan woman who is helping with the youth program, as well as with translation of documents. She and I are sharing an office and it's a blast! We've become good friends and are always joking with each other and giving each other a hard time.
